- 1) a. Carefully explain Aquinas' defense of the importance of basing human laws on Divine, Eternal and Natural laws. Be sure to include his four reasons for Divine Laws.
 - b. Regarding the letter from Ginny Yingling, analyze the issue raised according to Aquinas. That is, would he, in your view, support Ms. Yingling's argument?
- a. In the dialogue between Socrates and Crito, select two points on which they disagree; describe their disagreement.
- Carefully explain why Socrates must be labeled an Absolutist, while Crito can be labeled a Relativist.

- 3) "Law is a command of a lawgiver which obliges society."
 - a. This quote is the definition of law according to Positivism. Explain carefully.
- b. Carefully explain why Positivism is opposed to basing laws on Morality, being sure to include a discussion of the "penumbra."
 - 4) a. Carefully explain why Positivism is consistent with Utilitarianism.
 - Regarding the article on Immigrants, particularly the comments by Carlos
 Canales, show how Hart might support the cause of the Immigrants, both legal
 and illegal.
- 5) "Judges are simply 'living oracles' of law. They are merely 'the speaking law.' Their function is purely passive. They are 'but the mouth which pronounces the law."
- a. Carefully explain why Formalism (Beale) would support this definition of law; while Realism (Frank) would deny this definition of law.
- b. With whom (Frank or Beale) do you agree and why? Explain carefully, defending—not merely stating your reasons.
- 6) a. Carefully distinguish between West's "Separation Thesis" and "Connection Thesis."
- b. Give an example of a law which, in your view, reflects each of these views. (If you cannot think of a law which reflects the "Connection Thesis," as West believes these don't exist, describe a change one could make in a current law so that it would reflect this thesis.)
- a. Carefully explain Dworkin's three types of Civil Disobedience.
- Regarding the ad from ConsumerFreedom.com, explain how Dworkin might be able to defend the actions of PETA.
 - c. Would you agree or disagree with Dworkin's defense in this case? Explain carefully.
